IS, Pushp Vihar and Amitasha Saket, played host to Rani Hong, Co-founder of Tronie Foundation, an organization working for emancipation of victims of human trafficking and putting an end to this crime against humanity.

Her efforts led to the the US being the first state to pass laws to prevent human trafficking and provide aid to the victims of human trafficking.

Her inspirational story from being a victim of child labour at the age of seven to being adopted by a US family and then
